Delta Plan Critique

The health of our Delta is becoming a major concern to a number of groups and organizations in our state. Even the state water management agencies seem to be conceding that, just maybe, they have not been doing a good job, and are taking steps to determine how sick it really is. A "Delta Stewardship Council" (DCS) has been established to formulate a comprehensive water management plan that will both allow for the distribution of adequate water supplies and restore the health of the delta and its fishery. It is hoped that this council will pursue that goal and not just develop a pseudo plan that, in reality, is just a disguise for another justification for diverting more water out of the delta.

The Council has released several "draft" versions of a plan for the Delta, and just recently, their fifth draft. Some groups see encouraging signs that the DCS is consciously trying to develop a responsible plan; however, their latest draft is still lacking recognition of several major issues that need to be addressed. A coalition of concerned organizations has compiled a critique of the latest draft that addresses those issues. The critique was circulated to, and approved by more than 200 environmental and fisheries and wildlife organization. The Tri-Valley Fly Fishers was one of those groups.

The critique, complete with all the approving signatures, was sent to the council. It is a very thorough, detailed, and comprehensive list of issues and requirements that need to be considered, before the plan can be effective and acceptable. A condensed summary of some of the issues listed is as follows:

- ▶ In order to establish a healthy and reliable water supply, diversions from the Delta must be decreased. A comprehensive unbiased and objective, scientifically based, maximum export level criteria must be established and implemented. Contracted export levels by both federal and state agencies must be in compliance with those criteria.
- ▶ In order to further reduce the export pressures on the Delta, thousands of acres of impaired and pollution-generating farmlands south of the Delta must be retired, and their water contracts terminated.

DeltaStripers.Com is dedicated to guided catch-and-release fly fishing for stripers and large mouth bass on the waters of the Sacramento/San Joaquin Delta.

A fishing day starts about sunrise and lasts nine to eleven hours with a break for lunch. While catching lots of fish is never guaranteed, a typical fishing day will yield from six to ten stripers per rod or a dozen or more bass per rod. Some days are much more productive and yes, some days are a little tougher! However at the end of every cast there may be that 35 pound striper or a 15 pound largemouth just waiting to rip that rod out of your hands.

Come spend a day on the delta. I can't guarantee you'll catch fish but I'll guarantee you'll have a great day on the water!


- ▶ In order to reduce the demand on Delta water requirements the management plan must include a mandatory, aggressive, statewide water conservation/efficiency program. It must include both urban and agricultural users. The program would include both water conservation and recycling strategies.
- ▶ The Delta ecosystems and wildlife cannot be restored without major reductions of pollutants that are flushed into the Delta. A management plan must be implemented that will place reasonable limits on these discharges. The plan must also include a responsible program of habitat improvements for the Delta.
- ▶ Levees/infrastructure need major improvements throughout the Delta. Upgrades and/or repairs must be made in accordance with updated design criteria which address applicable earthquake concerns and predicted sea level rises.

As you can see this critique is complete and comprehensive. The cost of implementing such a plan could be a major concern, especially in these economic times, however, so would the proposal to increase water storage (dams) and a major alternative conveyance system (Peripheral Canal). Many experts believe that the proposal to build new dams and the peripheral canal will do little to fix our water management plan (just more of the same). Assuming that the critique has merit, and would work, the cost of implementing the plan would be a bargain; and the restoration of the Delta within the very near future is becoming an absolute priority.

Our state is blessed with a great water resource; however, it has reached the point where the resource is no longer able to meet the demands that have been placed on it. This has to be a result of our states water management program which must be changed. Since our Delta is the center point for most of the major water supplies in the state it is critical that a healthy, reliable management program for the Delta be defined and implemented. The requirements and details outlined in the critique document appear to be a major step in achieving such a program. Hopefully, the DCS will get the message and address the issues in a responsible Delta management plan.

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Delta Striper Outing: December 3, 2011

As TVFF Fishmasters, Rick Mikla and I will lead the striper outing on Saturday, December 3rd. This is a great opportunity to experience hard pulling, double digit freshwater fish on fly gear. We will fish the Southern bays of Discovery Bay and plan to launch out of Orwood Resort by 7:00AM. You should arrive at least ½ hour earlier in order to set up and get your boat in the water. We will head South about one mile to the Kellogg Creek entrance of Discovery Bay. This is an all-safe 5 mph area and it works well for both small and larger size watercraft. The outing will take place in rain or shine, but plan on a cold morning and the possibility of morning fog for a few hours (we hope the weather cooperates better than last year!)

A boat is required to participate in this trip. Boaters and non-boaters will need to make arrangements and get paired up before the outing.

Equipment: 8 or 9 wt rod with Hi-Speed / High Density shooting heads. Lead core heads, Teeny 300, Rio Outbound or Mastery Custom Tip Express lines trimmed to match the rod all work well. The integrated style lines are easier to cast than lead core. Your leader is simply 5-6 ft of 15 - 20 lb mono (Maxima). Flies that simulate baitfish patterns such as 3-5 inch Clouser minnows, Flashtail Whistlers, Deceivers, etc. work well. The 2/0 chartreuse and white Clouser is a standard. Take a look at past newsletters for December and January of '07, '06, '05 for what has been successful.

We will provide more information as we get closer to the outing and we can get more specific as the stripers move in, usually around mid to late October.

A sign up list will be available at the November 3rd meeting.

TVFF Lower Sac Float Trip Report October 2011

Members Ron Dueltgen, Don Garner, Frank Gordet, Steve Ruley, Wynn Smith, Rob Vellinger and Ken Javorsky embarked on a float trip on the Lower Sac on October 14th and 15. We reserved 4 guide boats through The Fly Shop and split up on different sections of the river. Some of us did Posse to Anderson and some did Anderson to as far as Red Bluff.

All the guides uses the indicator method of fishing. Most of the time we had 3 files on the line. Rubber Legs, Bird's Nest, Micro May and eggs all worked well. As usual 20% of the flies used caught 80% of the fish. You just have to find the 20%. I was surprised that the egg bite was not more aggressive but I guess the salmon spawn was not in full swing when we went up.

Most of us averaged 6-8 fish per day and including some Steelhead that were caught below Anderson. Rob Vellinger landed a 25" Steelie at one of the salmon holes below Anderson. It was an impressive fish for the Lower Sac even by Jim Broadbent's standards.

Frank Gordet caught plenty of fish even while experimenting with a new fishing method. For a few hours Frank was fishing with a fly that didn't have a hook. He had a lot of excitement and action using this method but not fish that were landed to the boat. Don Gardner and his son Joshua also caught plenty of fish. While Don caught than his son; Joshua's fish were "impressive".

The highlight for me was the conversations we had at diner in the evening. We all had fish stories and other tales to tell. What was particularly interesting was the discussions regarding the nuances between the guides we had. There was definitely different methods of hook set, photography and landing.

Bottom line was we all had fun and caught fish. Just remember to bring the 20% of the flies that catch the most fish. I think we will do this trip again next year.

We haven't had much rain yet, but it was evidently enough, as there are steelhead in the Trinity. I spent three days last week on the river. The weather was perfect and the fishing was pretty good. In three days of fishing I had about twenty clear takes which I converted into seven fish to the net ranging up to 26". In the past, I've done best by fishing the "soft water" at edge of the main current. However, just last weekend they dropped the flow out of Lewiston Dam to only 300 cfs (it usually runs over 400 cfs), so the Trinity is low. The fish are there, but are holding in the center of the main current. This is where I got most of my takes.

Just thought I'd send a report about our trip to Clearwater Lodge: I won this stay at the Club's Raffle night.

Janet and I went up to Clearwater October 6th through 9th. Great place. Located between Fall River Mills and Hat Creek, very close to the Pit River above Lake Britton. The lodge is very nice, clean, comfortable with a few cabins in addition to six or seven main lodge rooms. They serve great food. Dinners included grilled pork, stuffed chicken breast and mahi mahi with plenty of side dishes, home baked bread and great desserts. They must be doing pretty well as the entire place was booked on our weekend.

We couldn't get a guide out for Friday but booked a drift on the upper Pit River near the lodge downstream to the Hwy 299 bridge. Just a little under five miles but plenty of water to fish, as this section of the Pit is very big water. Nymph fishing with "bobbicaters" below fast water runs and deep pools with Large Rubber Legs and smaller Prince Nymph droppers. We ended up catching quite a few fish but lost many trout also. The takes were subtle for such large big rainbows. Our guide, Tom was absolutely fantastic. Janet and I were very impressed with his hard work and endless patience. A great day on the river. On Sunday we headed back but stopped at Manzanita Lake. We each managed one fish. The weather up in the park was pretty cold however.

All in all I give the lodge high marks. I will say, however it's not cheap, with room rates from \$250 to \$350 per night per person. If those rates fit into your budget a three night stay with access to the Fall River and the upper Pit River will be a great weekend of trout fishing. Janet and I hope to make it back to Cleawater next year.

A Visit with John Bjorkholm on the Rogue River

I traveled with my wife up to the Ashland, Oregon area in the middle of September and made arrangements to meet with our former local member John Bjorkholm to fish the Rogue River. John recently retired to the Medford area and has been fishing and exploring the Rogue River for the last year or so. I have fished the Rogue intermittently over the last few years and was very interested in having a local contact. I was able to plan for a few short trips to the river with John in between various social obligations in Ashland.

We fished what is considered the Upper Rogue on Sept 11th and 12th. The Upper Rogue stretches from Medford upstream to the Lost Creek Dam above Shady Cove. The first morning we swung flies with our spey rods and managed to pick up a few small hens 22-24" but nickel bright near TouVelle Park. The flow was down to about 1500 cfs, I think, at the time. We fished with small conehead Silver Hiltons (and similar flies) and I used a midbelly floating spey line with a 15 foot mono leader. The first picture shows John battling a nice hen with his spey rod. He was using similar flies to mine with a Skagit system with a Type 3 sink-tip.

The second photo shows the sweet wild 24" hen the John landed.

At the end of our morning fishing session, John showed me around the Denman Wildlife Refuge which is just a few miles upstream of TouVelle Park. He had identified some likely runs for steelhead fishing and wanted my opinion of them. When I saw the water up there all I could do was drool and start fantasizing about my next trip. The water in the refuge has many classic steelhead runs. John has secured a key to the refuge and can fish it anytime he likes. I had some social obligations in the area so did not fish the afternoon or evening, which I heard are very productive times to fish in the early fall.

On the 12th we floated the upper river with a guide, Steve Walser, and indicator nymphed with eggs and uglies. In the first fishable run downstream of the Lost Creek Dam at McGregor Park, John hooked a nice hen that came unglued and got off. John then hooked a huge salmon on an Otis Bug which taped out at 42" w 24" girth. We thought that at big steelhead might have rolled on the flies and got tail hooked, but when it came to the surface we saw that it was a huge buck Chinook securely hooked in the upper jaw. The fish was very stubborn coming to the net and Steve kept warning John to put more of a bend in the rod. The fact the that rod was bent so far that the tip was way lower than the butt made me very nervous and the rod eventually blew up as I was shielding my face. Fortunately, the rod a 10 ft 7 wt belonged to the guide, not John, and since he gets them cheap from the manufacturer he was not concerned by its destruction. Took a good half hour to land and bottomed out Steve's Boga-grip that had a 36 lb capacity. When we finished with a few quick hero photos that fish took off with a shot, giving us a good tail splash. John even got to hold the fish.

While John took a short break to have a new rod rigged up, I nymphed through the same run and hooked a nice hatchery hen that jumped several times. The fish took a large red Copper John, probably a size #8. Most of the nymphs we used were #8 and #10's, much larger than what I have been successful with on the Trinity. The larger nymphs hook very well. John and Steve decided that they wanted to smoke the hatchery hen so she was quickly dispatched and slid into the cooler.


During the day we hooked a number of 22-24" hens, mostly on Copper Johns and Hares Ears, and one on an egg pattern. Fishing was fairly good and we hooked up about once an hour on nymphs. Near the end of the afternoon I landed a final wild 24" hen. I was not available to fish the evening (Shakespeare was on the agenda) so we ended the trip around 4 PM. I guess that if we had fished the evening we would have hooked a few more nice steelhead.

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

We did not swing flies that day, although we passed a few runs that looked very enticing. I have heard that the evening fishing has been pretty good. I enjoy the Rogue, there are lots of good runs for swinging flies and if you like indicator nymphing there are many good seams for that too. If you have any interest in fishing the Rogue I would encourage you to contact John and get a current fishing report. I am sure that John would be very happy to fish with any members of the club and he is doing a very nice job researching the river and gaining access to prime runs. The Rogue River has steelhead in it all year long but fall and spring are the prime seasons.
