I had a great drift fish trip with Russ O'Brien and guide Frank Hastings of Nor Cal FlyWaters on the Feather River below Oroville. I have never seen so many salmon migrating and Frank tells us this is the most salmon he has ever seen in the American River. Could be a good omen! We were after the Steel Head that follow the salmon but found that the Salmon also liked our #16 nymphs and as required by law whenever we determined the "fish on" was a salmon we would break them off. We must have gone through 20+ set ups. Despite all the irritation of having 20+ lb. salmon on and having to re-rig after breaking them off we were able to hook up with several steelhead. The last one we estimated at over 10#. The good news was we had several fish on putting up a fight for over 10 minutes. The weather that day was bright and clear in the mid 80's. And for those of you who might be like me and really don't enjoy the typical wet and cold weather associated with Steelhead Fishing this could be a good alternative for you.

One of the new classes that TVFF has put together is the Fly Fishing Fundamentals Class and we have one scheduled starting in October. Unfortunately only a few people have signed up. Surf Perch Clinic

Martin Plotkin, Fish Master

Space Available on Both Days at this Time

Bill Scharninghausen will be doing a presentation on surf perch fishing for our October meeting. Two days later on October 5 Bill will do a clinic for up to six people on the beach at Moss Landing. The clinic will cost \$300 for the group which should break down to \$50 per person. If there is sufficient interest there will be a second clinic the following day on Sunday, October 6. So far nine people have expressed interest in the clinics. The first six people to give a me a \$50 deposit at the October meeting are in the Saturday clinic and the second six people will be in the Sunday clinic.

The clinics will start at 6 AM at the entrance to the Pajaro Dunes resort next to the entrance to Palm Beach state Park. To get there take Highway 1 South from Santa Cruz toward Watsonville and Monterey. Take the California 129/Riverside Drive exit. Stay to the right and turn right onto the road. At the first light take a left onto Lee road. At the first light take a left onto W. Beach St. and follow it West until it dead ends at the entrance to the Pajaro dunes resort. Park diagonally on the right side next to the state Park. I estimate an hour and a half driving time from Livermore.

Plan on being on the beach at 6:30 and you should be able to fish in good incoming tide through the morning cycle. It is expected that we will finish around 10:30 or so.

Several of us will probably rent a condo at the Pajaro dunes the night before the clinic. Please let me know if you are interested in joining us.

What to bring:

- 7 or 8 weight rod 9 foot or 9 ½ foot
- integrated shooting head (250 to 300 grain) or a shooting head setup with a type IV or type VI head
 - tippet 10 – 15 LB. Use this for leaders instead of traditional tapered leaders.
 - hemostats
 - nippers
 - flies
 - chest pack (no fishing vests)
 - waders (boot foot is great if you have them)
 - SCUBA booties or Tiva sandals (don't use traditional wading boots)
 - wading belt (must have)
 - good wading jacket or kayak dry top
 - hat
 - sunglasses
 - stripping basket (optional, if you are comfortable using one)
- if you feel more comfortable, inflatable PFD, such as Sterns collar PFD is great insurance.

Delta Striper Outing

December 7, 2013

As TVFF Fishmasters, Rick Mikla and I will lead the striper outing on Saturday, December 7th. This is a great opportunity to experience hard pulling, double digit freshwater fish on fly gear. We will fish the Southern bays of Discovery Bay and plan to launch out of Orwood Resort by 7:00AM. You should arrive at least ½ hour earlier in order to set up and get your boat in the water. We will head South about one mile to the Kellogg Creek entrance of Discovery Bay. This is an all-safe 5 mph area and it works well for both small and larger size watercraft. The outing will take place in rain or shine, but plan on a cold morning and the possibility of morning fog for a few hours (we hope the weather cooperates better than last year!)

A boat is required to participate in this trip. Boaters and non-boaters will need to make arrangements and get paired up before the outing.

Equipment: 8, 9 or 10 wt rod with Hi-Speed / High Density shooting heads. Lead core heads, Teeny 300, Rio Outbound or Mastery Custom Tip Express lines trimmed to match the rod all work well. The integrated style lines are easier to cast than lead core. Your leader is simply 5-6 ft of 15 - 20 lb mono (Maxima). Flies that simulate baitfish patterns such as 3-5 inch Clouser minnows, Flashtail Whistlers, Deceivers, etc. work well. The 2/0 chartreuse and white Clouser is a standard. Take a look at past newsletters for December and January of '11 and '12 for what has been successful. We will provide more information as we get closer to the outing and we can get more specific as the stripers keep move in, which usually starts around mid to late October. It is looking like a good season this year with lots of bait already arriving and being chased by hungry stripers!

Conservation Corner

“WATER” The Abuse Continues

In a recent edition of the “Delta Flows Newsletter” produced by “Restore The Delta” it was pointed out that a seldom discussed drain on the Delta’s water supply is far more serious than many realize. It pointed out that in many of the southern areas of our state where “Big Ag” is a major user of our water, “Big Oil” is also responsible for much of the exports and environmental abuses to that area.

Oil production has been a major part of the economy of that area for many years, however, extracting it from underground can be somewhat involved. The crude there, “heavy oil”, doesn't flow easily, so a process called “steamflooding” has been implemented to reduce the oil's viscosity and push it toward horizontal well bores underground. There it can be pumped to the surface. This process has been used for about 50 years, however, the major problem with it is the volume of water required to accomplish the extraction, and the amount of waste residue it generates. For every barrel of crude oil produced using this process approximately eight barrels of fresh water is used and nine barrels of residue is generated. In 2008, one area injected nearly 1.3 billion barrels of water to extract 162 million barrels of oil, plus nearly 2 billion gallons of waste residue.

Some might consider these figures as just “the cost of doing business”. The cost in dollars and cents is one thing, however, the toll it is taking on our environment is becoming overwhelming.

Most of the fresh water used in this process comes from “The Delta”. The water is pumped by way of our state and federal water projects. This volume added to the amount that is already being diverted from the Delta for metropolitan domestic and industrial and for “Big Ag” users in the southern part of our state equals more surplus water than is available from this source.

In addition, it turns out that many of the “south of the delta” agricultural water users are selling part of their allotments to the oil producers for large profits, and then petitioning for additional allotments from the Delta to grow “food”. If their requests are denied they accuse us of “sacrificing food production for protecting tiny smelt and other fish”. Of course the water they sold for large profits instead of using it for growing food is forgotten.

There is no control over allotting water on a priority based on where it is being used. The Department of Water Resources says that they are not permitted to control what the water is used for. A spokesman for the department has been quoted as saying “once we deliver the water through the aqueduct to the local agencies it's their business what they do with it.” Some day they are going to have to figure out that it is not possible to deliver more water to the users than is physically available, and then establish an equitable water distribution plan that actually works.



In addition to the water shortage problem the residue waste that is generated in the process is destroying the health of the environment in those areas. Oil companies do not reuse the polluted water because it would cost them more to recycle it than to buy replacement water on the open market. To dispose of it with a minimum of expense, they pump it into underground areas, and dump it into unlined evaporation ponds, ditches, etc. The pollutants in this residue are contaminating water supplies for local residents of those areas. It has been responsible for totally destroying all the trees in local orchards. It is undoubtedly being spread by storm drainage, etc. and who knows how much is seeping into underground water tables that are drinking water sources etc. Likewise, the impact on local wildlife and environment has got to be a major concern.

I understand that this is the land of opportunity and our citizens have a right to establish a successful business etc. as they choose. However, it should not be at the expense of the destruction of the environment and natural resources around them. We owe it to our descendants to inherit a world and environment that is, at the very least, as healthy as the one we inherited. It's about more than just \$\$\$\$\$\$\$\$\$\$\$\$\$\$.

Exit Highway 580 on North Livermore Avenue
